> mention needs to be made of Jarrod Anderson and Ryan van Heezik. Ryan, the team's top scorer, went from strength to strength as a basketball




player, deservedly gaining the honour of the

Dear Parents and Caregivers

The planting out of the stream banks with nature shrubs and trees at Townleys Road behind Scott Technology has made good progress this week. It was good to read the article about it and see the photograph in the Otago Daily Times earlier in the week. All credit must go to Dr Simon McMillan for his drive and enthusiasm for this project and to the Year 13 Science class for their planning and organisation. This opportunity is practical environmental education at its best. Many teachers and students have also been involved in the planting and the results will be there for everyone to see and enjoy for many years to come. Thank you to all who have helped.

Bridge to Bridge Ping Pong Race - This is a fundraising innovation for KVC sports which may become an annual event. It is the brain child of Mr Stephen Henderson (KVC caretaker and cricket coach) and he has planned it carefully and found sponsorship for the 10 prizes that will be won. Basically, entered ping pong balls will be dropped in the water from the upper footbridge to the gymnasium. The first 10 ping pong balls to reach the finish line under the downstream footbridge will win their owners a prize (Any relationship to the ancient game of Pooh Sticks or the Baldwin Street Jaffa Race is purely coincidental.) Teachers have cards and each entry costs \$2. The two top prizes are a Telecom Wildfire mobile phone followed by an 8G IPod Touch. Worthwhile vouchers for Fat Harry's restaurant, Moyles, The Warehouse, Stirling Sports and for petrol and firewood make up the balance of the prizes. Parents and students are encouraged to buy their ping pong balls from any teacher or from the main office or the student office. The race takes place on Thursday October 6.



RECIPE OF THE WEEK


ROMANIAN PRAJITURA CU LAMAIE (LEMON LOAF CAKE)

Ingredients

- 250g very soft butter
- 5 eggs, separated
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1 cup sifted flour, plus 3 tbsp.
- Grated rind and juice of 1 lemon
- 2 tbsp chopped nuts

Preparation Instructions

Cream soft butter. Add yolks and sugar beating until very fluffy. Lightly fold in sifted flour, lemon juice and rind. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into well-greased loaf pans 3 x 6 inches. Sprinkle on top with chopped nuts. Bake in preheated oven at 350° about 1 hour. Serve with whipped cream or plain yoghurt.




FISH AND GAME NEW ZEALAND

RESULTS PUBLICATION IN 2012 NZQA is confirming its intentions for the publication

of results in January - March 2012 **Key Messages**

- Students should access the learner-login area of the NZQA website to view their NCEA results in early January 2012 and Scholarship results in early February.
- Printed NCEA result notices will **not** be distributed to all learners automatically. Learners who require a printed result notice must request one from the learner login between September and December.
- Scholarship result notices will be distributed to all candidates in February 2012.

NCEA Results

- The learner login will be NZQA's primary publishing medium for
- Printed result notices will only be sent to learners on request. It is envisaged that only those students without internet access to view their results will request a printed notice.
- The facility to request a result notice will be available on the Learner login area from September to 31 December 2011. Learners may supply an alternative address for the delivery of the result notice. There is no charge.
